Ministries for the LORD . . . A deeper look into the various ministries of the Port Orchard church of Christ

Ghana

The Tweens and kids would like to thank you for your participation in donating money to Ghana. Because of you, they were able to exceed their goal of raising \$1,000!

Thank you so very much, from the heart. We hoped to take a few minutes of your time to answer some questions people might have about this ministry.

WHAT IS HUMAN TRAFFICKING?

Human trafficking is modern-day slavery. It's important to understand that slavery still exists in our world, both at home (in the U.S.) and abroad.

Modern-day slavery can be invisible, as is often the case when underage youth are coerced into prostitution. These teens and children are terrorized, threatened, abused, and manipulated until they comply with prostitution "work." These kids may not always live behind physical bars, but they are unable to escape.

Modern-day slavery can also be quite obvious, as it is on the Ivory Coast. For example, if you Google the phrase "human trafficking on the Ivory Coast," you will find that the problem is rampant and largely unaddressed by the government. Boys are brought to the Ivory Coast and forced into slavery in the cocoa, pineapple, and coffee industries. Girls are forced to work in restaurants and, subsequently, brothels.

WHAT IS HAPPENING IN GHANA?

Thousands of children have been taken from their families and trafficked into the fishing industry at Lake Volta in Ghana.

The average age of these children is 10, though kids as young as 3 still become slaves. These kids are not given adequate food, clothing, or medical care. Their slave-owners force them do difficult and dangerous work every day.

Lake Volta is a man-made lake, and its waters cover many submerged trees and debris. Trafficked children are forced to dive under the water to untangle the nets. Some of them don't even know how to swim. Children sometimes die in this work of untangling nets.

The government has not tackled the problem of human trafficking at Lake Volta on a large scale. Therefore, the International Justice Mission, as well other organizations, have stepped into the gap.

WHAT IS THE INTERNATIONAL JUSTICE MISSION?

The International Justice Mission (IJM) is the largest anti-slavery organization in the world.

They have rescued 49,000 people from slavery/oppression.

They have helped law enforcement arrest over 3,800 traffickers and criminals.

They have 17 field offices in Latin America, Africa, South Asia, and Southeast Asia, with 5 partner offices in Europe, Australia, and North America.

WHAT MAKES IJM DIFFERENT?

The International Justice Mission is a Christian organization. It is a 501 (c) (3) dedicated to eradicating slavery. And they are good at it.

IJM uses Christian lawyers and other professionals to partner with local law enforcement and to influence the entire justice system. They not only extract slaves from their traffickers, but they work to break the cycle of trafficking itself by ensuring the local justice system puts criminals behind bars.

IJM knows where the slaves are. They know how to get them out. They know how to bring accountability to slave owners.

And we are also a key part of this process.

GOD'S PLAN "A"

Gary Haugen, founder of the International Justice Mission, wrote a book called "The Good News About Injustice." In it he explained that Christians often think that they are secondary in God's plan to bring justice to the oppressed and hurting in the world. However, Hagen argued that WE ARE GOD'S PLAN to bring justice.

Christians are not some Plan "B" effort to make change in this world. Instead, we are God's choice, His Plan "A", to fight against oppression.

For some people, like those in IJM, this is the great effort of their lives. However, I believe that for most of us, God calls us to fight against injustice in small ways. We should never underestimate the "small things done with great love."

We can buy a Fair Trade chocolate bar; we can buy a Fair Trade t-shirt. We can give some money to the Tweens at church. We can give some money to other organizations too. We do little things with great love and serve a living God who is able to do ALL THINGS.
