Instill a Love for God's Word into the Hearts of Our Children

- <u>Read the Bible regularly</u>: Pick a designated time to regularly read scripture to your kids. One thing that can greatly help in this
 endeavor is making sure each child has their own Bible whether it's a picture storybook-style Bible for little ones, or a "real" Bible
 for your bigger kids. It can also help if your kids see that you read scripture, but be careful not to use your reading as an excuse
 for not spending time with your kids. You don't want them to resent God's Word. If they have a spiritual question, teach them to
 find a scriptural answer.
- <u>Memorize Scripture as a family</u>: Choose a scripture verse or passage to memorize as a family, even if it's just one verse every other week. Helping them choose a scripture from what you read together is a great way to train them to memorize verses that are important to them.
- <u>Sing hymns together</u>: Singing hymns or other spiritual songs together as a family is another great way to help kids internalize and love God's truths. Teaching them to compare song lyrics to scripture is a good way for them to internalize the importance of letting scripture guide them in life.
- Pray with your kids and for your kids: Take the time to consistently pray with them. Make sure they know that prayer is important
 to you. Pray for guidance through God's Word. A regular prayer time is great, but also pray together as life happens. For example,
 my daughter and I developed a habit of praying whenever we heard a police, fire or ambulance siren. "Someone" was in need of
 prayer right at that time.
- <u>Be transparent with your kids</u>: This goes for both our strongest and weakest points in our personal walks with God. It means being transparent about the joys we have in our relationship with Christ, and about our shortcomings and sin. Apologizing to our kids when we have sinned against them is wonderful way to bring them back to our weakness and the power of the cross. It opens a door to meaningful conversations with them, and brings trust into our relationship that allows them to also be honest about their own sin.
- At the same time, share your victories with your kids. Rejoice with them in answered prayers; in small daily moments of praise for His goodness, and in all the ways He blesses you. Be on the lookout daily for how the Lord is working in the world around you, and share those things with your kids.

Being a disciple is hard. There's a reason Jesus said it requires denying ourselves and taking up our cross (Matthew 16:24). In our culture, it is an exercise in endurance, a constant walk up a down escalator. Complacency is ever-looming, and it's easy to become lazy in our faith and hard to resist temptation. I think it's good for our kids to know that we also sometimes struggle with being a faithful follower of Christ and that we have times of doubt and discouragement (don't we all...). It can be a lesson to them that our salvation is not dependent how perfect we are, but by God's perfect faithfulness to us.

Above all, as you parent and teach your precious ones, always cling to Him who is a perfect parent - our heavenly Father.

Study Questions Chapter 7

- 1. Why did Jesus decide to help the Centurion?
- 2. What make this healing different from others?
- 3. Jesus made a statement about the Centurion's faith. What was it?
- 4. In the greater context of the text, how did he know to ask Jesus?
- 5. Jesus in Nain comes across a woman. What did He feel for her?
- 6. What you feel if you show the boy raised?
- 7. Why did John question who Jesus was?
- 8. How does Jesus describe John to the crowd?
- 9. How did the woman enter the house of the Pharisees to anoint Jesus with her tears?
- 10. Why give the attitude of the Pharisees about the woman; how does it help set the narrative?
- 11. Jesus then tells a parable, who was it for (context)?
- 12. In vs 48 Jesus makes a statement or claim, what is it?

After the sermon on the plain in Luke 6, Jesus returns to Capernaum, where He made His home. However, He was sought after. Many people wanted to meet Him and have Him heal their sick. It was on His way back that a group of men, representatives of a Roman Centurion met Him. This where chapter 7 starts. Jesus is fulfilling His ministry and He is amazed by the faith of a gentile. Luke highlights these interactions to show his audience that the gospel message is for everyone. Remember when Jesus was in His hometown of Nazareth and speaks (ch 4). He brings up the reception of the gentiles and they want to kill Him. The gospel is for everyone who will hear and obey.
