Be Transformed

In John 8, a group of scribes and Pharisees brought a woman caught in the act of adultery before Jesus and asked what should be done. It would seem these men were concerned about following the law correctly, but this was not so. They knew Scripture very well. However, they were mistaken about how to read it and apply it.

What was the problem?

The scribes and Pharisees read the Bible as applying to others but not themselves. They found the sins of others described in Scripture, but not their own. This temptation does not escape us today. We can read the Bible as only applying to our religious neighbors or political enemies. We can read it as pointing out the faults of those we disagree with and never consider how it might correct our brokenness. This is not how to read Scripture, nor is it how we are to live.

If our focus is the sins of others, then there is no redemption for ourselves. Transformation is not possible if I do not know or acknowledge my own faults. I cannot expect change if God's word never speaks to me. If the Bible is about my enemies and not myself, I will use it as a bludgeoning tool to attack others. John 8 is an example of this. The scribes and Pharisees were willing to have a woman put to death to win an argument.

These problems do not apply solely to Christianity and Scripture. We see them in our world. There are groups of people, TV networks, celebrities, etc. devoted to pointing out the problems of others. It is all they talk about. They are even willing to ruin lives just to be proven right.

What good does this do?

None. If all we talk about are the problems of others, then we never better ourselves, and yet this is what much of the discourse in our culture is. Transformation does not happen because we are focused on other people's sins. Winning arguments is the goal rather than forming better communities, organizations, and people.

It is not spiritually healthy to always be looking at others. It is not healthy in a religious environment or any other environment. When we focus on the sins of others and ignore our own, we are laying the groundwork for creating toxic personalities and toxic communities. We will convince ourselves we are doing right as we go after others, all while excusing gross wrongs in our camp. There will be no mercy shown to others because we do not think we need mercy ourselves.

The best thing we can do for ourselves and the world we live in is to allow Scripture to speak to us and help transform us into the image of Christ. Are there wrongs being committed in this world? Absolutely! Are we surrounded by people who refuse to do what is right? Yes, but consuming ourselves with these wrongs does little or no good and can lead to the corruption of our souls. Blame and accusations will not deliver the world from depravity. The only defense against darkness is light.

What must we do?

We must hear the word of God.

Let God's Word speak to you. Listen to His voice and apply His teaching to your life.

We must be transformed.

We are to become like Christ. Get rid of anything in your life that is leading you away from Christ and embrace the ways of Jesus. Put off the works of the flesh and put on the fruit of the Spirit.

We must follow Jesus.

Imitate His words and actions. Seek the good of others, not their destruction. Be a light at all times, but especially in the darkest moments.

When they are challenged, they chose God and rather than ask for comfort from the persecution, they ask for boldness to keep speaking for God. May we have the same prayer. Please join us as we look deeper into Acts.

Bible class is important. It is where we can share our lives and learn more about the God we serve. I would propose to you that, no matter how many times you study a topic you can always learn more. God's Word is like an onion; the more layers you peel away, the richer the flavor, and the more flavor you get. We are starting a new study on "The life of Christ." We are looking at His life from the different gospels. Now we could say, I know who Jesus is and what He taught. I don't need to be in class. That could very well be true and if it is, then you have something to add to the class. Be a blessing to others in the class and share your understanding. I try to have discussions in my classes. I want us to engage with the text and dig for what we need from it at that moment. As we start to look to the future, I want to encourage everyone to get involved with classes. We have one on Sunday mornings and one on Sunday evenings; plus some small groups that are meeting at other times. We are to be a people of the Word, and that means that we study it together. Remember, we all have something to contribute. It is also a blessing to learn together. I hope that you will make time to join in our study time as we seek to know Christ better.
