

Thoughts on last week's article. By: Cody Rousseau

Last week we had an article on the "Problem of Biblical Authority." If you, like many, read and were confused or frustrated by this article, then good work for wrestling with a tough subject!

I wanted to distill some thoughts on this article this week and give some breathing room before continuing on with N.T. Wright's lecture. As we continue through his article, which is rather long, I plan to take a week in between each section and try my best to explain and organize some of the content.

In his first section he talked in the introduction about the historical pitfalls that Christians have faced when using the bible as an "authoritarian" text. The problem he is referring to is that we do not have a simple book of rules and regulations given to us in a neat 66 installment manual. Instead we have 66 books ranging from personal letters to poetry, from specifications and blue prints, all the way to narrative prophecy.

With such a huge and varied collection Christians have struggled since day one to comprehend and properly utilize the scriptures in a way that is healthy. If you need evidence of this a brief foray into church history will help illuminate.

During the Reformation, for instance, Catholic believers decided if the Anabaptists wanted adult baptism so bad they

could have rocks tied to their feet and they could be dropped in rivers. Sola scriptura. During the last 50-60 years the divisions in churches and believers hasn't lessened in any way.

This constant and very visible marring on the people of God is indicative of a problem with how we define and use "Authority."

So N.T Wright begins this article with some troubling words. He questions the way that we, and he, were raised to view scripture and truth and authority. Where does the final authority lie?

The issue is that we can see how a narrow view of the way that scripture teaches and guides us ultimately leads to divisive views based on personal worldview. Each of us sees scripture a little differently and we will naturally diffuse down into groups of likeminded believers. Finding groups that confirm our biases and points of view.

As this happens churches naturally hit tipping points wherein people have enough momentum to take any idea and make it central. Those who agree stay, and those who don't begin to "shop" for a place that confirms their beliefs and practices more closely.

It seems to me that we should instead, adopt a view that takes the story of God, the narrative text of scripture and look closely at how the story informs our understanding of Christ.

If we wish to see a time when more believers unite instead of divide then we cannot keep taking a course of action that bears divisive fruit.

The issue with an article like this, with ideas like this, and moreover with the culture of "individual" faith, is that in order to make positive progress one needs to be intensely devoted to study and prayer and listening.

In order to affect positive change we need to be a people who are MORE in tune with the Holy Spirit.

In order to know it's voice though, to know God's voice, you have to be studying and learning WHO God is.

I always think of the story of Moses other, and the burning bush when considering Jesus: these issues.

Moses stumbles into a conversation with the God of all creation and upon receiving his calling he asks, "What then shall I call you?" Moses is asking for power over the people, power over God, and God won't have it. He responds in the best way! "I am who I am. I will be what I will be."

To me this is the perfect story for us as we seek to wield authority. Ours is not a position of power, ours is not a mind that can understand God. Instead we are called by Christ to live as Christ lived.

If you are wondering what it should mean to give authority up and seek proper relationship with God look no further than Christ.

"5 In your relationships with one another, have the same mindset as Christ Jesus:

6 Who, being in very nature[a] God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage;

7 rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature[b] of a servant,

being made in human likeness. 8 And being found in appearance as a man,

he humbled himself
by becoming obedient to death—
even death on a cross!" (Phil. 4:5
-8)
