Tiny Village Visit

Monday, April 23, five members of the Tiny Cabin Fact-Finding Team, Gary Chasteen, Ken Avery, Lisa Bratcher, Tim Duffy, and Wayne Hammock visited a Tiny Village in Seattle (see photos throughout this bulletin). Jim Bolger, Assistant Director of Kitsap County Department of Development and Levi Holmes, a volunteer Project Manager, rode with us.

The village consists of 14 cabins located on a small lot owned by the adjoining Lutheran Church. The village is fenced and the entrance consists of a gate and a security booth. This village locks its gate at 10pm at which time the resident on call takes the key and the phone to their cabin. A resident wanting entry after the gate is locked must call the resident on duty that will then open and relock the gate. While the gate is open, the security booth is manned and entry and exit is monitored; guests must sign in and out. This is called a high-bar village. It has the highest standards for residency selection. Only referrals are considered and prior screening ensures this village houses only low risk individuals. Sexual offenders are not considered and there is zero tolerance for violence and drug and/or alcohol use. This particular village has a

\$90 monthly electricity cost so all the residents must have an income.

Within, the village is self-managed. This one has 3 elected positions: security, bookkeeper, and arbitrator. Larger villages would have additional elected positions, for instance, kitchen manager, bathroom/shower manager, and external liaison. Security is responsible for ensuring the entrance is manned while the gate is open and managing the key and phone when the gate is closed. The bookkeeper takes care of resident's paperwork, and the arbitrator is the first step in handling differences and disagreements. For issues not resolved at the village level there is a process in place to help. The village has a standard set of rules/guidelines that all must agree to and they may also add rules of their own. For example, this village has a rule about not spitting in the area in front of the cabins. They consider the area in front of the cabins their living room, despite being outside and covered in gravel. Michelle, a resident, commented, "who spits in their living room? That's not what people do".

The minimum suggested number of residents for a successful village is 20 (residents not cabins). They have found it takes 20 people to staff and support the security booth full time and to manage the other chores within the village. The village is clean and orderly and they strive to be good neighbors. We saw multiple residents: one had a cat, two had disabilities, there were several seniors, and a couple of middle-aged folks. We were able to interact with 3 of the residents and Michelle spent about 30 minutes talking with us, telling us about life in the village and the external support structure. Each of them expressed gratitude for having a safe place to sleep and for being a part of the village. There appears to be a good relationship with the hosting church, which invites them for breakfast Sunday mornings and has allowed them to remain in



place for several years. The church has asked for and received resident volunteers for a variety of projects.

We spent time talking with Josh Castle, Director of Advocacy & Community Engagement with LIHI (Low Income Housing Institute) who is contracted by the city to manage the villages. It was a good experience and the visit was very informative.
