The question now becomes what do I have to let go of in order to take on more responsibility with the ministry opportunities in Arlington. In order to continue I will have to learn a new lesson of leaning on new people to help my work now that I no longer have a team. I hope to use this as an opportunity way to grow closer to the body at Woodland West.

One of my roles is as a member of the implementation team. Focusing on implementing the mission of outreach at Woodland West. In the last two meetings we discussed a stronger focus on the college age students in the congregation, and looking to partner closely with the ministers of the Tri-C. An all too familiar experience for congregations, is losing their kids after college. Either they lose their faith while away, or just feel too disconnected when they return. How do we as the body of Christ make them feel welcomed and encouraged by their brothers and sisters back home? To not abandon them once they have stepped out on their own? I know that sometimes it is out of our hands, but we cannot let that deter us from intentionally seeking the next generation.
